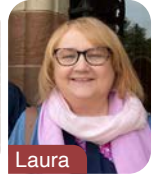

A Message from Helene, Rector in St Mark's

Doors are fascinating - and there are so many different types! Double doors, French doors, single doors, doors with a window and revolving doors. Then there are doors within a larger door, a wicket door. Some doors open out, others in. And that is before we start considering the plethora of colours.



Doors are intriguing. What is on the inside? we wonder. Many of us have, sometime in life, looked through a letter box or placed our ear on it, to satisfy our curiosity. In the Bible there are many doors for us to explore, providing insights into what God has in store for us, and openings to new opportunities – a new challenge, a new direction in life, spiritual growth, friendship with God and with those who like us have entered in.

Other doors lead to a place of protection and security, a place of rest. They take us to a shelter where Jesus is the door, the gate, the protective shield providing safety. Jesus said: There is a house with many rooms. It is prepared for us (John 14:1-6). We are invited to enter in through that front door. Welcome.

Sometimes we may need to look twice to find the door that leads to life. It may not be obvious at first glance. Keep on looking - it is there. Maybe in a corner, out of sight, ready to be opened and taking us to a place where God is.

The doors to St Mark's church and hall are open for exploration and growth in faith. Enter in for prayer and worship, and there is a place for you at the Lord's table. Come along and meet Christ, who gives us rest! (Matthew 11:28)

Behind An Open Door by Peter Spratt



We go through many doors in our lifetimes, often from the known to the unknown. Sometimes we enter with excited anticipation, sometimes with uncertainty, sometimes unthinkingly - and perhaps sometimes fearfully. The subject has occupied writers and artists throughout time...William Blake mystically invited us through the doors of perception; C.S Lewis took us through a humble wardrobe door into a wondrous other world; Seamus Heaney spoke of a door into the dark; Bob Dylan sang of a need to knock on heaven's door; and... yes, there are indeed many doors, both literal and metaphorical.

I passed through countless doors in both my academic and professional lives – to receive and give lectures, tutorials

and seminars; to interviews, meetings, presentations to clients (current or hoped for), conferences, and more. Often, I would exit through the same door, elated and with renewed vigour: disappointingly, I would sometimes exit with a hope diminished, and feeling deflated or underwhelmed, but again having learned from the experience: occasionally, I might have thought that I had wasted time – such a precious commodity to us all, and we must seize the moment, every moment!

Not so very long ago, I entered a door which I had passed hundreds of times in my car, on my bike, or walking - for it is a door close to both my home and my office. I entered with inquisitiveness, searchingly, perhaps more than a little needfully. I was immediately comfortable, met with kindness, smiles, and appropriate curiosity; a sense of 'all are welcome here' was tangible. This was a place where I might learn important truths, seize many happy and meaningful moments, reaffirm a purpose, and engage with wonderful people. The open door I had walked through is the door of St. Mark's, a door into a house of the Lord – and I am richly rewarded for having been as curious.



Biblical Doorways

Let's go through the keyhole!



Doors are about access or lack thereof. They are also places of transition. Sometimes doors are shut, other times opened. Sometimes doors function as entrances into something and other times they are exits, taking us somewhere else. Doors and doorways are filled with symbolism, and they are plentiful in the Bible. This study focuses on some spiritual insights from some of these doors and doorways. Each study is independent and stands alone.

We will explore advice given by the prophet Elisha to the widow (2 Kings 4:1-7) and Jesus' encouragement about prayer in solitude (Matthew 6:6).

An opportunity to consider one of the seven 'I am' sayings (John 10:7-10) as well as the meaning of the 'narrow door' (Luke 13:24).

Tuesday 29 September: Knock, knock – who's there?

Sometimes we knock and Jesus opens (Matthew 7:7-8), other times Christ knocks and we open (Revelation 3:20).

Prayers abounded there for many in need.

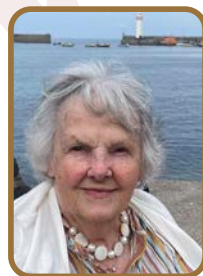
The Lion on the front door never roared.

The Lewis Legacy: A doorway to discovery

In our Spring 2026 magazine we shared plans to restore the Old Rectory at St Mark's (to be known as The Lewis Legacy), one of the few remaining buildings with a direct link to world renowned Christian author, C. S. Lewis. St Mark's was his home parish, his grandfather was the first Rector, and here Lewis was baptised and claimed for Christ. He returned many times later in life, not least to mark his journey back to faith and remember his parents in the stained glass 'Lewis window' in the church.



What is the vision? Our vision is to transform this 9 bedroom house into a hub where people of all ages can explore Christian faith, literature, imagination and creativity. Through exhibitions, talks, study, hospitality and community activities, The Lewis Legacy will celebrate the life, works and Christian faith of C. S. Lewis, and provide a place for discovery, discipleship and reflection, for the wider church and community.

What are the plans? We will create a multi-use facility including a C. S. Lewis visitor exhibition, a community cafe, a self-contained flat as a writer's retreat, and a library, along with a range of study and seminar spaces.

What has been achieved so far? In early August we spent a week as a parish praying over all aspects of the project – this is a daunting but exciting time, and we look forward to seeing how God will continue to bless our efforts. The Lewis Legacy Belfast Ltd was registered in June 2026 to ensure that this project is managed in a legal and appropriate manner. An application for charitable status has been submitted and a new bank account opened. Work on planning permissions is underway.

How much will it cost? We aim to raise £2.5 m to deliver the completed vision.

What is the timescale? Our target is to open the building by late 2028 to coincide with Lewis' 130th birthday.

More stories to discover this autumn at our monthly book club. We meet in the Rectory, 4 Sydenham Avenue, to share thoughts and a cup of tea.

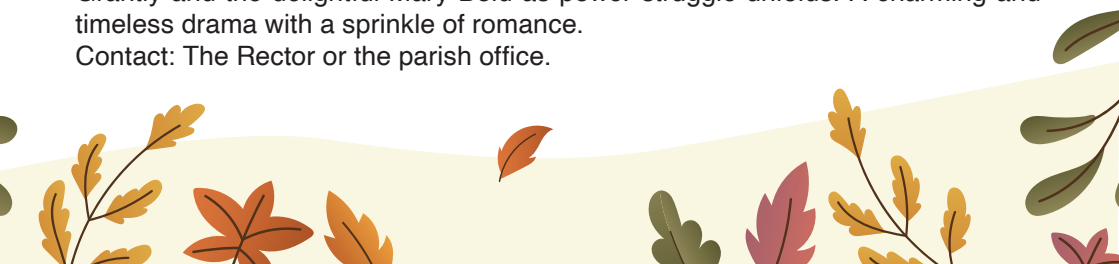
